Chevronizing Foreign Relations Law

Last week the Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit <u>ruled</u> that the act of state doctrine prevents former owners of property in Cuba from recovering damages from Club Med, which operated a resort on that property with the permission of the Cuban government. Cuba had expropriated the property from the family in 1959. Florida law would ordinarily permit plaintiffs to recover on theories of trespass and unjust enrichment, but under the act of state doctrine Cuba's expropriation of the property must be considered valid for purposes of the dispute. 

Perhaps most important is that all U.S. service members now undergo training in the "law of armed conflict," which spells out rules for dealing with civilians in a combat situation, said <u>Scott Silliman</u>, a law professor and executive director of the Center on Law, Ethics and National Security at Duke University.

The incident was noted in the next day's war communique by MACV, the U.S. command headquarters in Saigon. It said U.S. forces had killed 128 "enemy" in a sweep in Quang Ngai province. The name My Lai was not mentioned.

In a particularly chilling moment at his 1970 court-martial, Lt. William Calley, a platoon leader, testified that the "order of the day" from his company commander, Capt. Ernest Medina, had been to move the villagers, and if they refused, to "waste them."

How chilling, this is painful to read.

Medina later admitted he had suppressed evidence and lied to superiors about the death toll. Fourteen Americal Division officers were accused of taking part in a cover-up, but none was convicted.

I expect the same sort of cover-up during Haditha "investigations".

Lt. Col. Frank Barker, for whom the operation was named, died a few weeks later in a helicopter crash.





Not Just Another Witness: The Significance of the Testimony of Tariq Aziz By Michael Scharf

May 24, 2006, will likely be remembered as the high water mark for the defense in the Saddam Hussein Trial. On that day, Tariq Aziz, the Foreign Minister of Iraq during the Ba'ath Regime, took the stand to testify on behalf of the defense.

Even more than Saddam himself, Tariq Aziz is the Iraqi face most recognized by Westerners. Known for his white hair, glasses, expensive suits, and articulate statements in fluent English, Aziz has appeared frequently at the United Nations, foreign capitols, and on the international media during the past two decades. Many of us expected that the seventy-year-old former diplomat, who has been in custody since 2003, would end up testifying against Saddam in a plea deal, and that he would provide the crucial insider's view that would nail the lid on the case against Saddam. Instead Aziz testified passionately for his former boss. "I wanted to come and witness for President Saddam Hussein, because I know he has not committed any crime in relation to Dujail," Aziz confidently told the Iraqi High Tribunal judges.

Building on one of the main themes of the defense, Aziz asserted that the Iraqi government had reacted lawfully during what he described as a period of attacks by Iranian-allied terrorists and insurgents against Iraqi government officials, including an attempt on his own life at Mustansariye University a short time before the incident at Dujail in 1982. "No one is guilty of anything," Aziz opined. "The President of the State in any country, if faced with an assassination attempt during a time of war, is entitled to take procedures to capture and punish those who were involved." He added that there was nothing personal about the response to the Dujail assassination attempt.

Aziz compared the conflict in the 1980s to the instability in Iraq today, pointing out that the people in Dujail were treated no differently than the Americans have treated people in places like Falluja. In concluding, Aziz contended that Saddam was being prosecuted selectively as the fallen leader of a country

A Writer Speaks Truth

This post is in response to the iBlawg's recent <u>call for submissions</u> regarding Michael Crichton's New York Times Op/Ed.

Surprised by how apt Michael Crichton's critique was, I looked up his <u>biography</u>. Before becoming a writer, he picked up a *summa* at Harvard, got an M.D. from Harvard Medical School, and did research for two years at the Salk Institute. He therefore has had more scientific and technical training than two-thirds of the Federal Circuit's judges. (See below.)

Congress established the Federal Circuit in 1982, as a specialized court to handle appeals in patent cases. It did so primarily to curtail the "forum shopping" that had arisen due to different federal courts treating patent cases differently.

What happened next was a sobering lesson in unintended consequences: the Federal Circuit spawned much of the nonsense that Crichton satirized. <u>Read the rest of this entry »</u>




